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For the May issue article can be sent in November-March, editing will be done in April. For the November issue of the articles can be delivered starting in May-September, editing will be done in October. The article goes into the desk editors selected by the editor. Articles can be accepted without repair, refurbishment accepted, or rejected, and the article is rejected is not returned unless requested by the author.

STRUCTURE OF PAPER

The length of the manuscript of no more than 5000 words or 10-15 page. Articles are written by systematic and the following provisions.

1. Title: written in a concise and informative, maximum 12 words (single-spaced) should reflect the substance of the variables described in the article body.
2. Name of Author: without titles, the author can be an individual or a team.
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5. Abstract (**in English**): the length of 130-200 word, abstracts written in one paragraph includes: scientific review article consists of a discussion of the core issues and substantially while the results of the research article consist of goals, methods, and results. The abstract is single-spaced
6. Keywords: terms that reflect the essence of the concept within the scope of the problem may consist of several pieces of terms.

The body of manuscript :

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Reference/Bibliography: use APA (American Psychological Association) citation rules, cultivated from a primary source, and if it comes from the most current cultivated journals (3-5 years) and just acknowledgment of the source designated in the article body. Instead, the name that is referenced in the body must exist in the bibliography. Second row to the right of the entrance 7 letter. Here are some examples of writing a bibliography of several types of sources. Recommended to use **Citation Software** Ex. **MENDELEY, ZOTERO**, etc.

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APA utilizes a system of brief referencing in the text of a paper, whether one is paraphrasing or providing a direct quotation from another author's work. Citations in the text usually consist of the name of the author(s) and the year of publication. The page number is added when utilizing a direct quotation.

Indirect Quotation with Parenthetical Citation

Libraries historically highly value intellectual freedom and patron confidentiality (LaRue, 2007).

CITING SECONDARY SOURCES

When citing in the text a work discussed in a secondary source, give both the primary and the secondary sources. In the example below, the study by Seidenberg and McClelland was mentioned in an article by Coltheart, Curtis, Atkins, & Haller.

Seidenberg and McClelland's study (as cited in Coltheart, Curtis, Atkins, & Haller, 1993) provided a glimpse into the world.

In the references page, you would cite the secondary source you read not the original study.
